The earliest record of Cricket in America is found in the dairy of William Byrd II of Virginia. He refers to an early morning game with family and friends on the front lawn of his impressive estate, Westover, on the banks of the James River in Virginia on April 25th, 1709. There is also evidence that some of George Washington's troops played a game of "wickets" at Valley Forge in the summer of 1778 - no doubt also a form of cricket. The first American Cricket Club was founded at Haverford College in 1834. Today the sport has blossomed into a nationwide recreational pastime with over 25,000 players across the United States.
